Parting thoughts – comments written down on note cards when asked, "What must be involved in the management plans and not overlooked during these studies"

- SWCD always needs ideas to apply for grants to help solve erosion problems, etc
- Watershed District also has opportunities to apply for grants
- A serious consideration needs to be addresses in terms of plugged waterways. Rivers need to be cleaned to sustain economic activity in the surrounding areas.
- Water retention in Beltrami for Warroad River
- County/State/Townships/Federal purchase land for retention
- Individualized involvement
- As a landowner near (Roseau?) County Ditch #6 formerly owned land on both sides of the ditch system. When is the river and whatever tributary in that area doing to be cleaned so the ditch system can do its job??? I drowned out (crops) while one to the last had cows relaxing in the shade of the trees in the bottom of the ditch (just east of #35).
- There are several homes along the west branch and the main W'd River and the continual complaint is "when are they going to clean the river?" That alone would take care of many of the problems with the W'd River. All of this is beyond our jurisdiction. County, state, and federal entities need to work together even if each only does his own share.
- Where there are blocked in river by my place the river should dredge it. The river is washing
 over on land and it is getting wider and shallower. Many trees have washed out which blocks
 the flow. Turns in river usually are blocked and debris backs up on property. The west branch
 could easily be cleaned out so recreation could benefit from it.
- DNR, federal, state, and county could be contacted and work together. Residents along the river could report what needs improvement.
- Everyone that wants rock in front of their property should have access so the land doesn't erode. Grants should be available.
- Rules and regulations should be discussed before they are set in stone.
- Drainage ditches deliver water. Directing fertilizers and pesticides to streams and lakes too quickly
- Tile and ditching is becoming too prevalent. Need a permitting process.
- Entrance to Warroad River, Warroad Channel need to be dredged to remain a valuable harbor
- Environmental concerns raise cost to prohibited levels
